"As usual, we had a very busy and productive year," said the president. "A new floor loom was purchased for use in Extended Care and the residents have made good use of it, weaving pillows, place mats and other articles. New smocks with auxiliary

crests, are now being worn by the members, many of whom purchased one for their own use.

The New Year's babe was presented with a layette with the compliments of the Auxiliary.

In March, the Auxiliary celebrated its 40th anniversary. "It's come a long way in those years!"

At the regular meeting, the Hospital Board presented the Auxiliary with a beautiful oak plaque to be engraved with the names of all past presidents. This has proved to be quite a task as no one really kept a record, she recalled.

At the conclusion of the meeting they were treated to wine and cakes, courtesy of the Board.

At the Area Meeting in Victoria in April, it was noted that the Lady Minto Auxiliary was second in the Vancouver Island area for raising and donating funds in 1975.

The annual bursary was awarded to Marianna Shelby for the second year. She is in nurses' training in Victoria.

Once more, this year, at the annual convention, our residents in Extended Care won the award for their craft work. They were very pleased as they really enjoy their morning sessions.



At the convention it was noted there were 122 auxiliaries in B.C., giving 400,000 hours of volunteer labour and raising \$960,000.

This past year the constitution was changed to include the proposed Intermediate and Personal Care unit of the hospital to allow the auxiliary to include it in the disbursement of their funds.

Once again the Thrift Shop has been the greatest money-raising area. Total sales for 1976 were \$31,560. Approximately 7,000 hours of work were put in by all the ladies.

She also expressed thanks to all members connected with the Thrift Shop, washing, mending, sorting, pricing, selling. "there is so much to do".

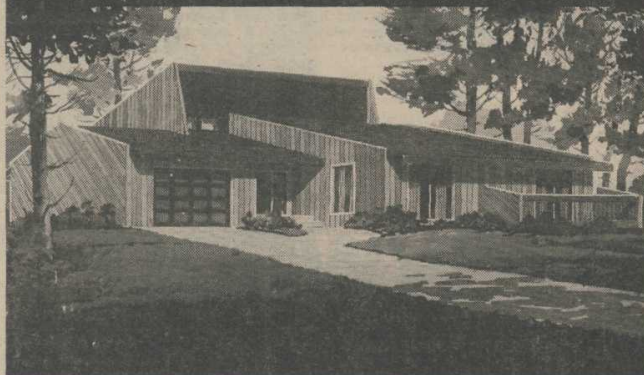
